Very many thanks for your letter of 9th instant together with enclosures. In particular, may I thank you for the kind thought in decorating the envelope with stamps ! The postman who handed me the letter made an envious remark to me about them !

I think I will answer your letter by taking the two items contained therein separately. Accordingly, I attach enclosures which will, I trust, assist you - and, regarding Azad Kashmir cause you a little research !

I had news today of the arrival with a friend of mine of an East Pakistan and Manuscript collection which he is thinking of buying. I understand that this came from India and as strongly as I feel warrants the occasion, I have written to him by this post, telling him to be careful of what he is buying, since I know that his knowledge of this section is very scanty to say the least. It may be that the collection is a perfectly good one and in which case I have asked him to give me details of its contents since this could well be of use to us. I have also asked him to call upon me for any identification which I know he will do.

My friend also asks me if I know of the possibility of obtaining a copy of a Handbook published in Karachi in 1965 or 1966 - a very limited edition of around 100 copies I have had to tell him that I regret that I do not even know of its existence and I must ask for your knowledge if any - of this? I certainly have never heard of such a book though would be interested in seeing such a publication.

I think that this about all I have to write in letter form for the moment and will turn to the enclosures.

I entirely agree with you insofar as I think that it is high time that this issue came off the list of "doubtfuls". I think that it should be deleted entirely from Page 71 of the book and take its rightful place under the Lahore District.

Page 71 does give some useful data on these stamps and together with my article of July 21st, 1961 will provide suitable background 1 think.

Regarding the known values of the issue, for the moment I know of only those recorded by Col. Martin but I shall be seeing irs. Earl with two weeks and feel sure that she has, or will know of, the information I seek. When I have this I will pass it on to you as quickly as possible.

Turning to Type II I am amazed to find that these are described as handstamps on Ordinary - surely this is a mistake? I have always been under the impression that the 17 x 2½ mm. in Violet was on Service stamps but does Zahid 17 x 2½ mm also knows of it being used on Ordinary as well?

In this connection I enclose a photostat of something published - I just forget where, in the U.S.A. I think - from information supplied by Mrs. Earl some years ago. 


Whatever transpires, the entry in the revised edition for Azad Kashmir will be considerably larger than in Col. martin's book originally! And of course this is all to the good.



Chapter III. Other Machine Printed Overprints.

East Pakistan.

Ordinary Stamps.

Bairsal District.

Basically, Page 17 of the above chapter provides a very good guide to hese stamps and only with the passage of years can I pass on to you the following items that research on my own stamps and those of others has revealed. I will take these point by point as follows:-

1. Col. Martin's comment that Type I was placed above Type II is not strictly accurate. The Type I appears to have been more to the middle of the sheet with at least two rows of Type II below them. It has been proved that the rows of Type I were at least three but cannot verify his suggestion of four rows. In existence are:



plus a number of pairs showing both types above and below each other.

- The use of Barisal's stamps extends from April 1948 through to October 1948. Cancellations for July, August and October exist in fair quantities.
- The use of the numeral "l" for "I" was not restricted to one stamp. Evidence exists of use at different points in the printing plate. KNOWN ON 108A - 12 as.
- Type I has been found to have several instances of "split" overprints where the plate alignment was not too good.
- There exist several stamps with a "Squashed" Type II overprint with letters down to nearly 1 mm. in height. Plating has been tried for this variety but insufficient examples preven them being put together. There appears also a short "I" and a "P" which appear consistent in what is a damaged overprint.
- The book's pricings would appear to make Type I more common than Type II. From examples available this is not so; they would appear to be on equal terms.
- The only additional values are those recorded in my article of July 21st, 1961, i.e. Type I = 8as. and Type II = 12as. with the articles accompanying remarks still applicable ! Of the lower values of both types the 9ps. and 11/2 are somewhat rare.

Barisal District (Contd.)

- 8. Still no covers have been found to exist though a good percentage of pieces with clear evidence of commercial use do exist. This shows more strongly than anything else the very low survival rate of these stamps.
- 9. The one copy of the variety overprint 15% x 1% mm. refuses to show its face anywhere and since he does not give its value one is hindered in this respect. It could be a %a. or a 1%as. and if so evidence is coming to light linking this variety with the Dacca Service Overprint. I shall have more on this later when I have had time to study the facts made known to me.

FRICING

As I remarked earlier, these are far too low. I will quote what I think are more realistic figures though, naturally, these are only my own views.

For Types I and II singles I would guage the following:- 3ps., 1/2a., la @ £2.

9ps. and 11/2as. @ £3.

2as. @ £2.50.

4as. @ £3.

6as. @ £4.

8as. Type I only @ £7.50.

12as. Type II only @ £10.

For 4as. Double Overprint probably a low figure of £30 is none too realistic.


For <u>Multiple</u> se-tenant pairs take the above figures and then multiply by three.

You may very well ask "and who will buy at such high prices?"; my answer to this is that these stamps must first be found to be bought so scarce are they.

All these additional facts for you have come to me from Morris Everett of the U.S.A. and in writing to thank him I have mentioned the fact that I consider he has done an excellent job on this District's stamps. I feel he should have due acknowledgement. As mentioned to you, with myself he is going right through the whole range of East Pakistan's Overprints and Handstamps and I only hope that you are well pleased with our work.



And what is more some of the postmerto were clearly Perhawar. The dealer swore that they were of Kaevalpindi origin, bothich neither I nor mus Earl believed. and so whent have we? (a) in view of discrepancy in size, can one rule out all possibility of it being Jacca Lype I! I think so.

(c) a slogan postmerk common to all large lowns and cities throughout Pakiston over a long period. (d) postmerk over handstomp in every case I have seen. (e) a clever forgery?? One may think so and be night first time but no large quantities have apreared in U.K., q. e. d. searcely worth the bother of a forged handstamp and a forged postmark. (f) the divergent distance between Perhawar and Jacca has me juggled. The King George VI half-anna postal card above, with 4 anna adhesive for registration, shows the earliest and probably the FIRST handstamped PAKISTAN overprint on an Indian card. The overprints are the same. This card, registration No.127, was from the 2nd Munsif's Court at Patiya, dated 17 Sep 47, only 34 days after Independence.


Nasik stamps were not in use in any of the Courts at Chittagong, Cox's Bazar, Patiya, and Raøzan in the Chittagong District until 13 Dec 1947.Nasik overprinted cards appeared later. To date, this card is UNIQUE.
